



# The Role of the National Incident Management (NIMS) and Incident Command System (ICS) in School Preparedness

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## NIMS Implementation Guidance

- ◆ *NIMS Implementation Activities for Schools and Institutions of Higher Education* outlines those actions schools must take in order to 1) Support the implementation of NIMS; 2) Integrate NIMS into the educational setting; and 3) Connect schools and campuses to their community partners. ED has identified those NIMS implementation activities that match the unique role of schools in a community, its needs, and its functions as response agents. - ◆ *Key Personnel and NIMS Training for Schools and IHEs* is designed to provide guidance to schools, local education agencies (LEAs), and institutions of higher education (IHEs) as they identify *key personnel* and required training courses based on their roles and responsibilities in the overall emergency management program as well as the specific responsibilities related to emergency preparedness, incident management, or response. For training purposes, ED recommends schools, LEAs, and IHEs identify their personnel in the following four categories: 1.) Executive Leaders, 2) General Personnel, 3.) Command Staff, and 4.) ## Key Personnel and NIMS Training Courses

ED offers more detailed guidance for emergency management teams to identify and determine key personnel on their campus across four categories: **Executive Leaders, General Personnel, Command Staff, and Incident Managers**. 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In accordance with guidance provided by ED, certain “key personnel” are required to complete as applicable six courses in order for an individual or organization to be considered NIMS compliant through FY 2010. In addition, for the purposes of the REMS grant administration, ED has determined that the school emergency management team may use its discretion to recommend another course for its Executive Leaders. These courses include the following:

1. IS/ISC-100: Introduction to the Incident Command System (*or IS/ICS-100.SC Introduction to the Incident Command System for Schools also constitutes completion of IS/ISC-100.*)
2. IS-200: ICS for Single Resources and Initial Action Incidents
3. IS-700: NIMS, An Introduction
4. IS-800.B: National Response Framework, An Introduction
5. ICS-300 Intermediate ICS for Expanding Incidents
6. ICS-400 Advanced Incident Command
7. G-402 Incident Command System (ICS) Overview for Executive/Senior Officials\*

### **Accessing NIMS Training Courses**

Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) administers the Emergency Management Institute (EMI) and provides training in emergency management. EMI offers free, online, independent study courses for emergency management personnel. Several of the introductory courses also have materials available to download for live trainings. The IS- 100, 200, 700, and 800 courses are all available online as Independent Study (IS) courses offered through EMI at <http://training.fema.gov/IS/>.

*G402 Incident Command System (ICS) Overview for Executives/Senior Officials* is also available from the EMI website as a downloadable file. NOTE: The course is not intended to be an online, independent course. However, due to the popularity and demand for the materials, EMI has posted them online in a downloadable format to increase access. To complete ICS-300 and ICS-400, personnel should contact their local or State emergency management agency for course dates and locations in their area. FEMA provides a listing of all State Offices and Agencies of Emergency Management online at <http://www.fema.gov/about/contact/statedr.shtm>.

Lastly, training may also be led by a qualified instructor. The National Integration Center (NIC), Incident Management Systems Division developed and provides guidance in the Five-



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Year NIMS Training Plan, "Course Summaries" (Appendix C). These summaries clearly state course objectives, discussion topics, and minimum requirements for instructional time and instructor qualifications per course. This guidance does not preclude any State, tribal, or local partner from maintaining more restrictive instructor qualifications. Any agency or organization sponsoring NIMS training is responsible for ensuring that the materials being taught adhere to the guidelines provided. The sponsoring organization must also verify the qualifications of the instructors based on the guidance provided by the NIC. The Five-Year NIMS Training Plan is accessible at
