This FEMA application enables leaders within your school or school district to receive alerts from the National Weather Service for up to five locations; get safety reminders and read tips to survive natural disasters and customize your emergency checklist; locate open shelters and where to talk to FEMA in person or on the phone; and update and share your disaster photos to help first responders.
